But they cannot do this alone. The support we all get from people at home is essential and key to morale.

The end of our time in Helmand in 2014 is in sight. We have made tremendous progress but there is still much to do-

That is the Army's duty and I know we can finish our job out

There is no question of cutting and running. It would betray all the skill, courage and hard work the Army has invested in Afghani-

That is clear to see in the towns, villages, schools and bazaars of Helmand and in the growing capability of the Afghan forces. Success is within our grasp.


For now though we should reflect on the deeply sad losses in the Yorkshire Regiment and the Duke Lancaster's Regiment Tuesday.
